

Adrian Venegas was honored for always helping during Community Events.



Last month members of Tribal Council and members of the Elders Council attended a training conference in Solvang. Below is Tule River Elders Council Chairwomen, Nicola R. Larsen's take on the conference.

I attended the Tule River Tribe Retreat in Solvang, California. I was amazed during the first three days of training. My brain was traveling at a rapid pace, I always loved learning, thinking has not been a real problem for me, I'm always thinking about how something can be done better, short-cuts, improvements, etc., that would be beneficial to the tribe.

I was happy to be a part of planning, economic development, tribal structure and marketing. I really enjoyed the breakout groups where we planned, strategized and recommended improvements and/or more economical ways for the tribe to operate.

The last two days could have focused more on Systems of Care rather than Historical Trauma & Colonization. If the trainer was going to focus on historical trauma then there should have been an outcome from historical trauma, not leave the group hanging and some, including me was left wondering, are they going to have an ending to this portion of training. I feel it should have had an ending something like this; although tribes endured horrific atrocities they emerged victorious as individual tribes, today they are successful in the business world, they are educating their children, they have prevention programs, health centers, they have adapted and overcome historical trauma.

Thank you Tribal Council for inviting the Tule River Elder's Council to attend the retreat and I hope it turns out to be an annual training. I learned so much.


There are Willie J. Carrillo's words from the Solvang training sessions.

1. The SOC-Historical Trauma Training brought out some harsh realities that my Tule River Yokuts participants have been through in our history. It gives our Tribal Council, Elders Council, Health Board and key staff an opportunity to come together and acknowledge our own historical trauma, better understand what we've been through as a People and offers the chance to move forward together.
2. Some of the highlights were the open dialogue with the Elders and the Powerful input from our youth representatives, which was an eye opening perspective much different from the adult perspective.

Traditional Gathering Policy

for lands in California managed by the
U.S. Forest Service and
Bureau of Land Management

-  It shall be the policy of the agencies to support traditional native cultural practitioners in gathering culturally utilized plants for personal, community, or other noncommercial traditional use on lands administered by the agencies, consistent with applicable laws, regulations, and policies. Gatherers shall have access for traditional practices to lands managed by the agencies.
-  Local units shall consider prioritizing local traditional native gathering in land management plans and should consider prioritization and other management documents.
-  Free use, without permit, of culturally important plants may be granted for traditional cultural gathering. Local agreements are encouraged to support such gathering.
-  Decisions and issues regarding identification of traditional native cultural gatherers are access, sustainability, and other concerns associated with gathering in the implementation of this policy. These will be addressed by local units in consultation with traditional practitioners, Tribes, and tribal communities.
-  Local managers of the agency shall work in collaboration with Tribes, tribal communities, tribal organizations, and traditional practitioners to identify, restore, and enhance traditionally important plant resources.
-  Local managers of the agencies, in consultation with Tribes, tribal communities, and native traditional practitioners, will identify opportunities and tribal partnerships to incorporate tribal traditional management practices to restore, enhance, and promote ecosystem health.

During the regular Tule River Native Veterans Post 1987 meeting, it was decided that the Color Guard would post the Colors for the Grand Opening of the Woodlake Cultural Museum. This took place on February 27.

Leland Castro requested travel assistance for a trip scheduled in May. He will take part in Veterans escort bringing to California a Fallen Hero's Cart located in Seattle. The Cart is especially designed to bring home the remains of fallen veterans in a dignified manner to their final resting place.



The evening ended with dinner and a cake for Carlos DeSoto to celebrate his February birthday.



News for and of the Elders

Last month the Elders had a very busy regular monthly meeting. The new Elders Council got right down to business.

Visiting the Elders this day was EMC Marketing Director Renee Garcia. Ms. Garcia was there to explain the bus scheduling for special trips. She explained that the Elders trip in April to New Mexico would have to be funded by EMC, Elders and possibly Tribal Council as EMC was not budgeted for this particular trip.

Also speaking at the Elders Meeting was Rick Gomez. He presented a letter that was read explaining how he felt work was not being done correctly by the Public Works Department and he was receiving community complaints because of the incorrect work. He was asking the Elders Council to support him in creating a position for him as Field Supervisor to oversee and work alongside the Public Works Director.

Darrell Vera said that he would like to see a letter of support for Mr. Gomez from the Elders Council. It was decided by consensus that Mr. Vera would write a letter.

Shane Christie also spoke to the Elders concerning his yard and lawn care service. He explained that if the Elders approved the service Tribal Council would pay him after the Elders signed off on his invoices. His fee will be \$15 an hour and \$15 an hour for the use of his equipment. William Carrillo Jr. stated that he was under the impression the Elders Budget would be responsible for these services and he needed to check with Tribal Council to clarify this. Later in the meeting a motion was made to accept Mr. Christie's lawn care proposal for Elders and disabled persons on the Reservation. Motion was carried with a vote of 6-1-0.

Mr. Carrillo gave a presentation on a weeklong training session for Tribal Government in Santa Ynez. He was there to invite the Elders Council and others interested in attending. Nicola Larsen has reported on this conference as well as Mr. Carrillo elsewhere in the publication.

Betsey Foote reported that she had ordered 50 Elders jackets for new Elders and those who have not received a jacket yet.

Celebrating birthdays at this meeting were Rick Gomez, Patsy Vega, and Raymond Flores. Lunch was great and as you can see by the picture the birthdays were celebrated with cake. The Tule River Elders Council would like to welcome Veronica McDarment as their newest Elder.

The next day it was on to the bi-monthly Eagle Mountain Casino Breakfast held at the Forest Buffet. As usual breakfast was great. After all had their fill,


COMMUNITY HOUSING NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Some words on St. Junipero

Did you know that last year in September of 2015 Pope Francis made Junipero Serra a saint?


Many Native Americans denounced the canonization, expressing disappointment in Pope Francis.

Why? This is one of the stories told:

It's a warm fall day outside Mission Dolores, where an Ohlone man whose baptismal name is Francisco is tied to a whipping post. A week ago he ran away to the village he grew up in, but the soldiers hunted him down and brought him back in chains.

A priest has gathered the other Indians at the mission to witness Francisco's punishment.

"Remember that this is for your good, my children," he says as he raises the leather whip. "The devil may tempt you to run away. But you must fight off temptation to gain eternal life." He brings down the whip on Francisco's back. After applying 25 lashes, he drops the whip, bows his head and says a prayer.



Saint or devil?



us, "My father was a good man, he gave us everything."

Occasionally she said, "Our" father including her mother, Juana and all of her brothers and sisters. It was just the way she talked.

"Our father had sheep, cattle, horses, chickens, goats and pigs. Maybe some more I can't remember. He had a big barn, corrals, pens, a house for the chickens and a nice house for us. He provided lots of food for us and the animals. We had a big garden. He was also generous to people and he had many friends."

"Each of us kids had our own horse and saddle. Each of us had to care for our own horse plus help with all the chores as needed. We had lots of other horses that were his, horses to work cattle, to follow after the sheep, horses to pull wagons and our buggy. Some of these horses did

This will be a combo of stories told to us by our mother Ida Garfield. Mostly I hope to tell it as if she was talking to me; as I am hearing it in my mind. She was born in 1911 on the Peyron ranch a ways up Deer Creek. "The ranch house was on the left side of the road across from the old chimney of the house where Ramona Silvas lived. That was all my father's ranch, both sides of the road, and part of the hills on both sides of the road."

Ida was 100 years plus when she died.

She is related to many people. Her Father's name was Celestino Peyron as most of our people already know. He was born in France.

Usually Mom began her stories by

telling

more than one thing like plowing a field. Some people had cars and trucks, my father did not. We had a wagon to go to town and buggy for faster trips, but it did not carry a lot. Every year my father painted his wagons green and the wheels yellow. They always looked pretty and clean. That was a long time ago."

"Our school was on the Diaz Ranch which was a long ways to go. On the way we met with the McDarment boys, Woodrow and Art (Kenny either was not born yet or was too little). Woodrow liked to tell us dirty naughty jokes, poems and stories. We laughed about them." (Woodrow, Art and Kenny were the sons of Ramona Silvas McDarment my mother's 1/2 sister. Their father of course was a McDarment.) "I also went to school with Glades McDarment. We always fought each other, but only with words. Now we are both old but we remember. We are still friends."

"When we went to town for supplies we had to stay overnight and go home the next day. We just camped out at night. My father always took two or three of us kids with him. We helped him load the wagon, unhitch the horses, brush them down, then fed and watered them. He bought lots of things, food for us and grain for the animals. Sometimes he bought shoes and cloths and bolts of material for my older sisters to sew into cloths, dresses and shirts. It was a long

slow ride by the wagon and took a lot of time. So we didn't go often."

"Another story: Among our father's good friends he had a few best friends. One of his very best friends was called Mr. Goodman (not his real name) came to visit. They talked and drank coffee. Mr. Goodman asked my father if he had a very gentle riding horse he could borrow. He told my father he needed such a horse to take some city people camping, hunting and fishing high in the mountains. Celestino agreed to loan him his very best, gentle riding horse. Mr. Goodman thanked him and took the horse home to his ranch. He told my father he would return the horse in a couple weeks. A couple of weeks passed then a couple

more. No friend came with his horse.”

“Finally Mr. Goodman came without the horse. My father invited him for coffee, waiting for Mr. Goodman to explain why he did not bring his horse back. Mr. Goodman then told Celestino that his beautiful very gentle horse had died. He said the horse had eaten some poisonous plants that caused its death. My father said he felt bad but did not blame his friend Mr. Goodman. Mr. Goodman told my father he felt better. My father told him that things like this happened and only God knows why. No one is to blame. Mr. Goodman left Happy.”

“Many months passed when one day the thundering sound of hooves from a very fast moving horse came echoing up the road. Soon it came into sight. It was my father’s horse! It stopped at our gate and nickered. My father let it into the barnyard. Then he told us to say nothing. Just wait. My father was angry, we could tell. We were all shocked.”

“We waited. A few days later two men came up the Deer Creek Road. They spotted the horse and stopped. They called to my father and said, “That is our horse.” My father said, “No it is my horse.” Then he told the men how he loaned it to his best friend. Then the men were shocked. Celestino told them to go find the man who sold them the horse. The now angry shocked men left.”

“My father never spoke to his friend again except once, to tell him he was no friend of his anymore. And that he would never speak to him again. Several times Mr. Goodman tried to talk to my father. He just turned his head and walked away not saying one word. My father, our father, was an honest man and he wanted his well chosen friends to be honest too.

Note from Ida:

Our father always paid the Tribe to pass his sheep over their land on the way to his mountain camp, left of Mule Peak. On the older Forest Service Official Maps his camp is listed as “Peyron Camp” and another camp listed was named “Peyron Grove”.

Notes from Lawrence Garfield:

Celestino Peyron was father, grandfather, great grandfather and more to many people on the Tule River Reservation. I’m sure others have stories too. Get some help and write them down. I still have a few more

Ida memorized the naughty stories that Woodrow McDarment told. She once in awhile told them. We’d all laughed. One time I wrote one of them down and now cannot find it – But Know I have it somewhere.
